PASTOR MIKE'S MUSINGS

Dear Warm Heart Friends and Family,

I remember watching the Wizard of Oz for the first time at the age of 8 or 9. I was at my grandfather's farm, laying on the floor eating popcorn into the evening with the whole family. There was a message about the movie right at the beginning, saying how this film has entertained families for 40 years. I remember thinking, 'Wow 40 years is a long time! Were people even alive 40 years ago?' Well, this memory I'm recounting happened over 40 years ago. The film is 86 years old this year! And the book by L. Frank Baum is 125 now years old.

The Wizard of Oz is a whimsical look at how to deal with the realities of life. I know—you thought it was just a children's film, but it's not. The plot begins with a nasty neighbor who tries to put Dorothy's dog, Toto, to sleep. As Dorothy runs away with Toto, a cyclone carries them to the magical Land of Oz. However, Dorothy quickly longs to return home. The locals tell her to follow the yellow brick road to the Emerald City where she will meet the Wizard, the only one in the kingdom who can help her. Along the way, she meets a Scarecrow who needs a brain, a Tin Man who wants a heart, and a Cowardly Lion who desperately needs courage. Traveling and adventuring together, they help each other realize that what they each need is already within them.



Now you may be wondering what this story has to do with the Christian life. It's an allegory of our Christian experience. What we need to live abundant lives and to serve God isn't found somewhere over the rainbow, but right here under the rainbow in the "Kansas" of everyday life. Dorothy's friends each needed something different...and we have needs and longings, too. Whatever we face in life, we can serve others. Whatever challenges are before us, we can persevere. Whatever doubt we carry, we can still find faith. As King David shared at the end of his life, "Acknowledge God, and serve him with wholehearted devotion and with a willing mind.... Be strong and courageous, and do the work. Do not be afraid or discouraged." (1 Chronicles 28:9, 20)

Here's a little prayer for the new year...

May God make this year a happy one!

Not by shielding us from all sorrows and pain,

but by strengthening us to bear it, as it comes;

Not by making our path easy,

but by making us sturdy to travel any path;

Not by taking hardships from us,

but by taking fear from our heart;

Not by granting us unbroken sunshine,

but by keeping our face bright, even in the shadows;

Not by making our life always pleasant,

but by showing us when people and their causes need us most, and by making us anxious to be there to help.

God's love, peace, hope, and joy to us for the year ahead.

UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH

With the new year upon us, I think of these words from Kelly Marciales, Order of Deaconess and Home Missioner, Alaska Pacific University, Palmer, Alaska:

"I am yon-sei, fourth generation Japanese American. My family has a tradition of making and sharing food with our neighbors every New Year's Eve, as a gesture of cultural knowledge exchange and fellowship. Each year, we invite community members who have never made sushi, or eaten sushi, to come to our home, and learn about the recipes our family brought over from Wakayama Prefecture in Japan at the turn of the 20th century. They learn how Japanese Americans adapted their recipes, like many immigrants do, to include vegetables they could find locally; how these recipes survived war, imprisonment, and relocation; and how these recipes were resurrected and given new life by the next generation. Through generational trauma, we heal through stories and food and community. In the Spirit of the One who ate first, then blessed the meal, we make food together and are blessed afterwards by the time we spend building relationships with our neighbors."

We may not all have the same kind of cultural knowledge to share that Marciales has, but we can still actively work towards building relationships with our neighbors. And we may have missed New Year's Eve, but every day is a great day to relate to others!

This year the United Women in Faith plan to build our programs around Micah 6:8 —

"And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

Congratulations to Judy Green, the recipient of our Special Mission Recognition Award! We give this award annually to someone who exemplifies the spirit of being in mission with women, children, and youth.

Please try to join us as we invite speakers, create hygiene kits, sew quilts, attend Mission U, participate in the Idaho Legislative Advocacy Event, read books, serve funerals dinners, work at NU2U, donate hygiene items for youth, and come together in fellowship.
