

## PASTOR MIKE'S MUSINGS

Dear Warm Heart Friends and Family,

"Standing on the promises I cannot fall Listening every moment to the Spirit's call, Resting in my Savior as my all in all, Standing on the promises of God."

Thus ends one of my favorite hymns.

In the early days of our country, a weary traveler came to the banks of Mississippi River for first time. There was no bridge, of course. It was early winter, and the surface of the mighty river was covered with ice. Could he dare cross over? Would the uncertain ice be able to bear his weight?



Night was falling, and it was urgent that he reach the other side. Finally, after much hesitation and with many fears, he began to creep cautiously across the surface of the ice on his hands and knees. He thought that he might distribute his weight as much as possible to keep the ice from breaking beneath him. About halfway over, he heard the sound of singing behind him. Suddenly a man, driving a horse-drawn load of coal across the ice, came flying by him, singing merrily as he went on his way. 

#### FINANCIAL NEWS

Happy 2025! It is with a joyful heart that I write this newsletter after 2024 ended with such a miracle. We began the year facing a deficit of \$21,000. I am still basking in the euphoria of a surplus of \$68,543 to kick off the new year! This record-breaking ending to 2024 was due to a December giving figure of \$162,689. I felt confident that we would close our November deficit of over \$27,000 to almost breaking even, but never in my wildest dreams could I have predicted the end result. Thanks to the awesome Church of the Warm Heart in coming through once again.

It is time to present the 2025 Budget to the entire congregation. We pride ourselves in being transparent regarding finances. We have experienced an influx of new members who are contributing to the financial position of this church. Coming from many churches, different denominations, and methods of raising funds, I'd like to explain how we set the budget. We practice faith-based giving here. You are not asked to make a pledge and then the budget is set based on those contributions. Our policy is to ask the ministers to set a request of how much will be needed to maintain and increase their area of responsibility. Certain fixed costs such as utilities, insurance and other benefits, normal maintenance, marketing, shared giving (which is set by the conference) and administrative costs are a part of the final budget. The SPPRC committee makes recommendations regarding raises for staff and starting salaries of new hires. Once all of that is compiled, the finance committee prepares the budget for a final recommendation to the Administrative Council (which is the governing body of the church). Two years ago, tweaks were made to this process and it is now much easier for each committee to participate in the process and aid in the final approval.

There are many positives as we begin 2025. Our youth and children ministries are growing, attendance is up, our on-line viewing is increasing, we have made updates to enhance our worship space, and there is a positive feeling every Sunday. With that being said, we know that unexpected events will occur and we will be asked to adjust. We are blessed with dedicated members who are willing and able to make additional gifts when needed. With all the positives listed above, it is now time to explore the 2025 budget. I have broken the budget into four categories for simplicity.

**Personnel** - Staff wages and benefits. This largest category includes four full-time and ten part-time employees. (65%) **Property/Maintenance** - Utilities, property maintenance and repair, janitorial and snow removal services. (15%) **Shared Ministries** - Our tithe to the Oregon-Idaho Conference includes conference wide leadership and education, worldwide services and missions. (12%)

Local Ministries and Programs - Budgets for each of our ministries, as well as marketing and administration costs. (7%)

The 2025 budget has been decreased by more than \$29,000 from the 2024 budget. However, this is still an increase of almost \$56,000 over the 2024 actuals, due to an increase in Shared Ministries, utilities, costs related to expanding our local ministries, small raises to staff, and some planned major maintenance repairs to our facilities. Let's face it-our facility is over 50 years old. Things break or need updating. Last year we made some major repairs to the FLC, had roof issues in the sanctuary, had to remove some trees, and added carpet. We are fortunate that some church members stepped up and bear costs which relieved the general budget of deficits.

Our 2025 Budget has been approved, and we will need to receive gifts of \$753,331 if we spend the entire approved budget figures. This rarely happens, because our staff is very frugal, but it takes money to run ministries!

I talk and write a lot about our deficits, but there is one more area of giving that I wish to address. The following missions are worthy of our continued support: Meridian Food Bank, Good Samaritan Fund, Memorials, NU2U, Youth Mission Trips, Scholarships, Camperships, Quilters, Card Makers, Joseph's Closet, Scouts, Veteran's Footlocker, Mirror Image, UMCOR, Refugees, Adopt a Family, Thanksgiving Boxes, and the Crop Walk. I am sorry that I cannot give you the exact amount given for these missions in 2024 (all over and above our budget). I should have the figures for the March newsletter.

As we begin 2025, I sense an attitude of optimism in our congregation. Things are looking up and I would ask you to pray about our finances, our staff, our standing committees, our elected officials, our first responders, and our armed forces, and that God will continue to bless the Church of the Warm Heart. Please feel free to contact me (Don Brister) or Lori Jones, Finance Committee Chair, if you have questions regarding our finances. We will always take the time to meet with you to discuss your

"My life has radically changed since her death. She moved in with me in 2000, thinking that after brainstem surgery, maybe she still had a few years. God being God, we had 23 more! When she passed there was immediate emptiness. Her spot on the sofa empty, her bedroom door, baby monitor off. There was always humor and silliness she excelled at it. I would often say, 'Mom! Get some new material!' We would laugh. She would say, 'Hey, I know the only reason you keep me around is for a laugh!' It never got old. But, what now? Since then, I've been in continuous prayer for new directions. I needed Bible verses; Jonah 2:12: 'In my distress, I called to the Lord, and he listened to my cry.' And Matthew 6: 9-15: the Lord's Prayer. These are precious ways to remind ourselves of God's presence and relationship with us. Our needs will be provided! Praise God in times of pain."

Whatever transitions you may find yourself in, God is with you. You can turn to his Word for direction and lean on your community of fellow women in faith as well!


