PASTOR MIKE'S MUSINGS

Dear Warm Heart friends and family:

Every now and then, it's nice to just hear a good story about good people. So here's a story about Shirley Bachelder, borrowed largely from one that UMC Communications published in 2016. If you would like to see their video featuring Shirley at 95 years old, you can do so at this link:

Shirley Bachelder is pictured here in her late 90's. She was a leader in her United Methodist Sunday School class. A helper to those in need. She once took in a homeless man her daughter brought home from the park.

"When I got to the back room with the couch in it, the Lord tapped me on the shoulder and said, 'Have him sleep there.' So, Ahmad was with me for two years. I had been praying for an angel and he certainly was."



Prayer was an important part of each day. Shirley's signature flower headbands were a gratitude tradition she started way back on her 80th birthday. "I was kind of nostalgic and thinking about all the wonderful things that God had given me...the three beautiful children, the wonderful husband, the nice house, the garden, two wonderful cats, and you know, all my friends and all the church. And I thought, 'I should do something.' And I said, I will put flowers in my hair. And in the morning when I put 'em on I will say, 'Thank you, Lord, for all the good things that you have supplied me with. Thank you.'"

Shirley was a bit of a local celebrity around her town in Tennessee for convincing an ad agency to put up billboards—for free! reminding people to "love one another." It was something God asked her to do. Her daughter took her photograph, they took it to Lamar (the billboard company) and they said they would put up 21 of them.

When asked what she might say to someone who felt lost, Shirley answered, "Lost? Oh, I would love to meet that person because I would say, 'You know, You're one of the lambs that are lost. And somebody's looking for you. And I know who's looking for you. It's the Lord."

Shirley said one of God's greatest gifts in her many years had been the friends God sent to walk with her every single day. "The more we love, the more we find that life is good and friends are kind. For only what we give away, enriches us from day to day."

I share this with you just in case you needed a happy story.



FINANCIAL NEWS

I am still grateful for the outstanding effort by all in finishing 2024 in a positive position. Our finishing surplus of \$68,543 bodes well for a stress-free first quarter as the new year begins. I have had some members come up to me on Sundays and ask, "We did so well and now we are in the hole again. How could that happen?" The simplest explanation is to say that we failed to receive enough gifts to cover the expenses for January. One reason is that four times in the year we have three payroll periods instead of two. January was one of those months. February will see us return to only two payroll periods. We also had some above normal trustee expenses and we

Additional equipment to improve sound quality in the sanctuary and more chairs will be purchased in the near future. All of these upgrades or additions were made possible by a number of our families' dedicated giving and did not come from general operating funds. What a great church we're part of! Again, thanks to those generous members of our congregation.

Our youth are getting geared up for their mission trip to South Dakota. They are raising funds to ensure a successful journey. Of course I have to plug their annual Trivia Night. Since I am asking the questions again this year, I promise to make them easy as usual. See you on April 5 at 6:00pm!

THE BOOK NOOK

Claudia Moberly

The "working poor" is a term most of us have heard, but we may not know exactly what it means or believe the phrase is even accurate. In her book, Maid, Stephanie Land introduces us to someone trapped in the world of the working poor, putting flesh and bones and even a name to the term — herself. As a single mother. Stephanie found herself needing to provide food, housing, medical care, and transportation for herself and her daughter without any support from family.



She describes the relentless tension of holding a lowpaying job with no benefits, coupled with caring for a young child with on-going medical issues due to the sub-standard housing she can afford. She shows us the complicated procedures for obtaining various kinds of state financial aid, which generally has to be done during working hours, meaning she is unable to perform her hourly job, losing pay and threatening the retention of her job. She says, "I worked through illnesses and brought my daughter to day care when she should have been at home. My job offered no sick pay, no vacation days, no foreseeable increase in wage, yet through it all, still I begged to work more. My car's reliability was vital since a broken hose, a faulty thermostat, or even a flat tire could throw us off, knock us backward, send us teetering, falling back, toward homelessness. We lived, we survived, in careful imbalance."

Yet through ear infections, lost work for snow days, days spent drinking only coffee so her daughter could eat, working through exhaustion, and endless government requirements, Stephanie never loses sight that a home is made, not from bricks and mortar, but from love. THAT she has in abundance, and little Mia keeps her going when the road ahead looks impossible.

Spoiler alert: Stephanie is at last able to make it out of this fraught existence, but seeing what poverty can look like in this wealthy country of ours was sobering. Those of us who can look back on our first few thrifty years of marriage or those challenging days with young children, yet can also see parents or grandparents who offered a hand or a safety net for things that kept Stephanie on the knife edge of "making it," can be thankful for a benefit many of us thought of as natural, or even, unfortunately, took for granted.

This book comes from the Nurturing for Community section of the United Women in Faith Reading Program. It reminds us of the power of community and the emptiness of life without it.

UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH

So, what have we accomplished in the past 156 years as the official women's organization of the United Methodist Church? Here are some highlights of each of the 50 years.

1869-1909: Women organized for mission and laid the foundation for mission both nationally and globally; we started schools for women and freed slaves; sent lay women into the mission field

1909-1949: Developed programs that mobilized women to lead (particularly lay women in churches): to grow spiritually, to be educated, and to expand their worldview and act for justice

1950-1989: The focus was on ecumenism and racial justice by building the Church Center for the United Nations in New York City and writing the Charter for Racial Justice (that has been readopted at every General Conference of the United Methodist Church ever since)


1990-Present: We became a General Agency of the United Methodist Church; initiated a \$60 million Legacy Endowment Fund; we changed our name to United Women in Faith to better reflect our inclusion; and developed new branding, a new website, and new pathways to membership and giving.

Each month in this space, I have been sharing ways in which our Mission Giving dollars answer God's call to inspire, influence, and impact local and global communities and make a difference in the lives of women, children, and youth. So where are our Mission Giving dollars at work this month?
